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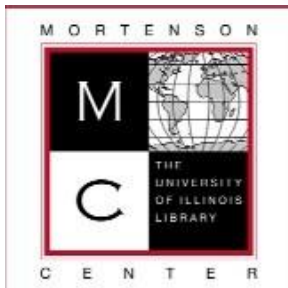

# What Libraries Can Do



- Hub of social and intellectual activity
- Space to bring international and U.S. students together
- Connect with campus activities and development
- Help community appreciate different ways of being in the world
- Connect campus with global issues

# Libraries and Globalization



- Reflect on how to be receptive to international students and scholars
- Establish venue to regularly talk with international students and scholars to understand needs
- Rethink collection development and services to address unique needs of students studying abroad and international students on campus

# Physical Space



- Provide a space for study and collaboration
- Technology equipped
- On site staff to provide help as needed
- Project based/collaborative learning spaces
- Tools to support creative efforts
- Provide e-books and mobile devices and apps
- Student-to-student, student-to-faculty, student-to-staff, student-to-information relationships

# Library Collections and Collaboration



- Offer wide variety of materials
- Collaborate with other libraries and institutions
- Provide more content via consortium
- Provide geographic and regional-based collections
- Provide print and non-print that support global curricula

# Global Reach – Local Touch



- Staff seminars on understanding and working with students from other cultures
- List of staff who speak other languages
- Provide multilingual tours of libraries
- Use Internet to provide access to news from other countries
- Celebrate international days

# Expand Global Reach – Local Touch



- Create “diversity committee” to reflect more intentionally on how to work with people who come from different cultures
- Stay in close touch with campus activities on international topics and get involved and make library a key player
