Our Heritage

The first public university in Illinois, Illinois State University was founded in 1857 as a normal university to prepare the state's teachers. Our institution has a rich heritage as the state's leader in all facets of teacher education – from classroom instruction to educational administration and national policy setting. Illinois State is the only doctoral research-intensive university in Illinois, offering more than 160 major/minor options in six colleges. The university's early emphasis on teacher preparation is reflected in our values-based commitment to creating an optimal learning environment for all Illinois State students, whether undergraduate or graduate, on campus or off campus.

Our Vision & Values

By acting on our values in every respect, Illinois State University will come to occupy a unique position of strength and visibility among the institutions of higher education in Illinois, nationally, and internationally. Illinois State University Board of Trustees

The Board of Trustees of Illinois State University is the governing board for Illinois State University. The Board consists of seven members appointed by the Governor for overlapping six-year terms. The eighth member of the Board is a student selected annually by the University student body. The President of the University serves as the primary liaison, linking the Board's responsibilities for policy direction to the University's operational responsibilities for carrying out its mission.

Carl Kasten

On July 25, 2003, Carl Kasten was elected Chairperson of the Board of Trustees. Kasten was appointed to the first Illinois State University Board of Trustees in 1996 after serving on the Board of Regents. He was elected the Board secretary from January 1996 through July 2003.

Carl Kasten is a former member of the Illinois Board of Regents and is senior partner in the law firm of Phelps, Kasten, Ruyle, Burns, Sims, and Meyer P.C. in Carlinville.

He received a Bachelor of Arts degree from Illinois State University in social sciences in 1966 and received his law degree in 1969 from the Northwestern University School of Law, where he was a recipient of the Wigmore Key.

Kasten presently serves as the Board liaison to the Illinois State University Alumni Board. He is a member of several bar associations, including the Illinois Trial Lawyers Association on whose Board of Managers he previously served. He is also a member of several professional organizations. (term expires January 2007)

J.D. Bergman

J.D. Bergman was appointed by the Governor to the Board of Trustees to complete the term of William Sulaski who resigned in May 2003. Bergman, a Joliet resident, is president and CEO of Petco Petroleum Corporation, Hinsdale. He received his bachelor's degree in Business Administration from Illinois State University in 1970. Bergman is also chairman of the Board of American Heartland Bank and Trust Company, Sugar Grove and serves as a director of the Illinois Petroleum Resources Board. (term expires January 2005)

Anne Davis

Anne Davis received her bachelor's degree in Elementary Education from Illinois State University in 1964 and served as a teacher in Harvey from 1964 to 1999. She earned her master's degree in counseling from Governor's State University in 1976, and was inducted into Who's Who in Teaching in 1988.

From 1978 to 1999, Davis also served on the Illinois Teachers' Retirement System Board. She became president of the Illinois Education Association in 1999, where she served until 2005.

In 2004, Davis was elected to the University's College of Education Alumni Hall of Fame. (term expires January 2011)

Nancy Froelich

Nancy Froelich is a licensed funeral director. She is a former trustee and chairperson of the Board of Governors, a trustee of the State Universities Retirement Systems and a past member of the Illinois Board of Higher Education. She is currently serving on the Civil Service Merit Board and actively participates in several community and state-wide organizations.

Froelich also served for eight years as chairperson of the McLean County Board and was a member of the Gridley School Board. Among many other community activities, Froelich also served on the executive committee of the McLean County Chamber of Commerce and Economic Development and the Mennonite College of Nursing.

She attended Illinois State University and Illinois Wesleyan University and has a degree from Eastern Illinois University. (term expires January 2005)

Joanne E. Maitland

Joanne Maitland is a retired Assistant Finance Manager for the City of Bloomington Township. She is presently serving as President of McLean County Board of Health and member of the McLean County Extension Foundation Board. She has served as President of the United Way of McLean County, Board Member of United Way of Illinois, Secretary of the BroMenn Health Care Inc. Board of Directors, Board Member of the Mennonite College of Nursing, Chairman of the Margaret Esposito Scholarship Committee, Chairman of the Ewing Scholarship Committee and served in various other community functions. (term expires January 2007)

Michael McCuskey

Michael McCuskey received his bachelor's degree in Political Science Education from Illinois State University in 1970, and served a history teacher at Ottawa Township High School before entering law school. He graduated from Saint Louis University School of Law in 1975 and was a partner in the law firm of Pace, McCuskey and Galley in Lacon from 1975 to 1988.

McCuskey was elected Circuit Judge in the 10th Judicial Circuit in 1988 and was assigned to the felony court in Peoria. He was elected to the Third District Appellate Court in 1990. He then served as an Illinois Appellate Court Judge until May 4, 1998, when he was sworn in as a United States District Judge for the Central District of Illinois.

McCuskey received an honorary Doctor of Laws from Illinois State University in 2003. He currently serves as a member of the Attorneys Advisory Council through the University's College of Arts and Sciences. (term expires January 2011)

Stanley R. Ommen

On July 25, 2003, Stanley Ommen was elected to serve as Board secretary. Ommen was appointed to the Board of Trustees in October 2000.

Stan Ommen is president and chief executive officer of State Farm's federal savings bank at the company's corporate headquarters. He spent the first 34 years of his professional life working in the banking industry for Champion Federal Savings & Loan Association, which became First of America Bank in 1993.

He is active in the local community holding such positions as board member and chairman of the ISU Foundation, and board member and vice chairman of the board of the Westminster Village Retirement Facility. He currently is a member of the Federal National Mortgage Association's Midwestern Regional Advisory Board. Mr. Ommen joined State Farm in 1997.

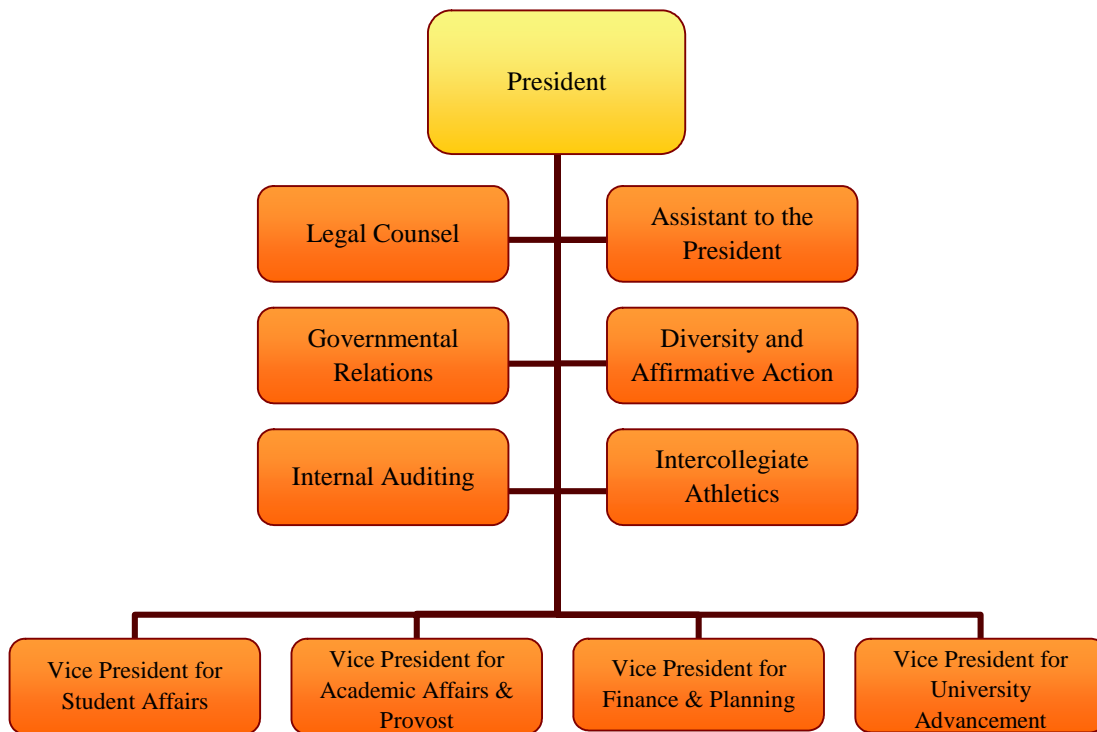
He earned his bachelor's degree in business administration from Illinois State University and his MBA from the University of Illinois. (term expires January 2007)

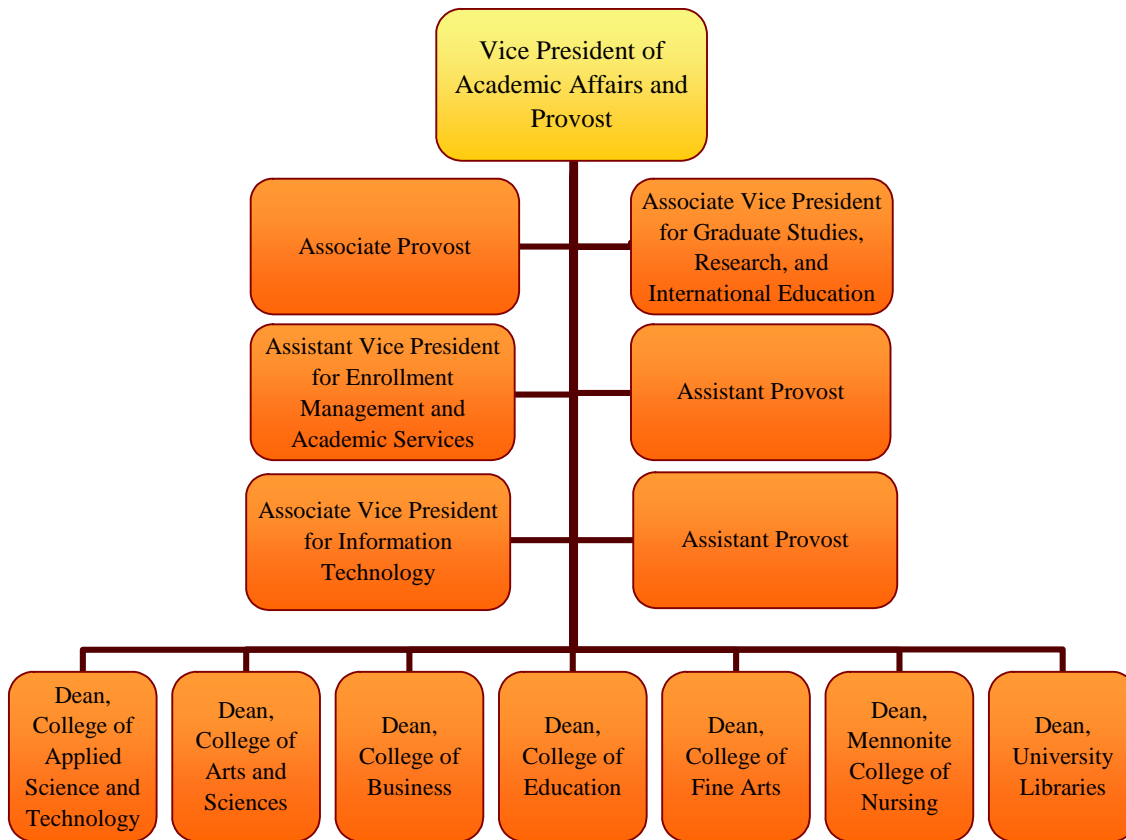
**President

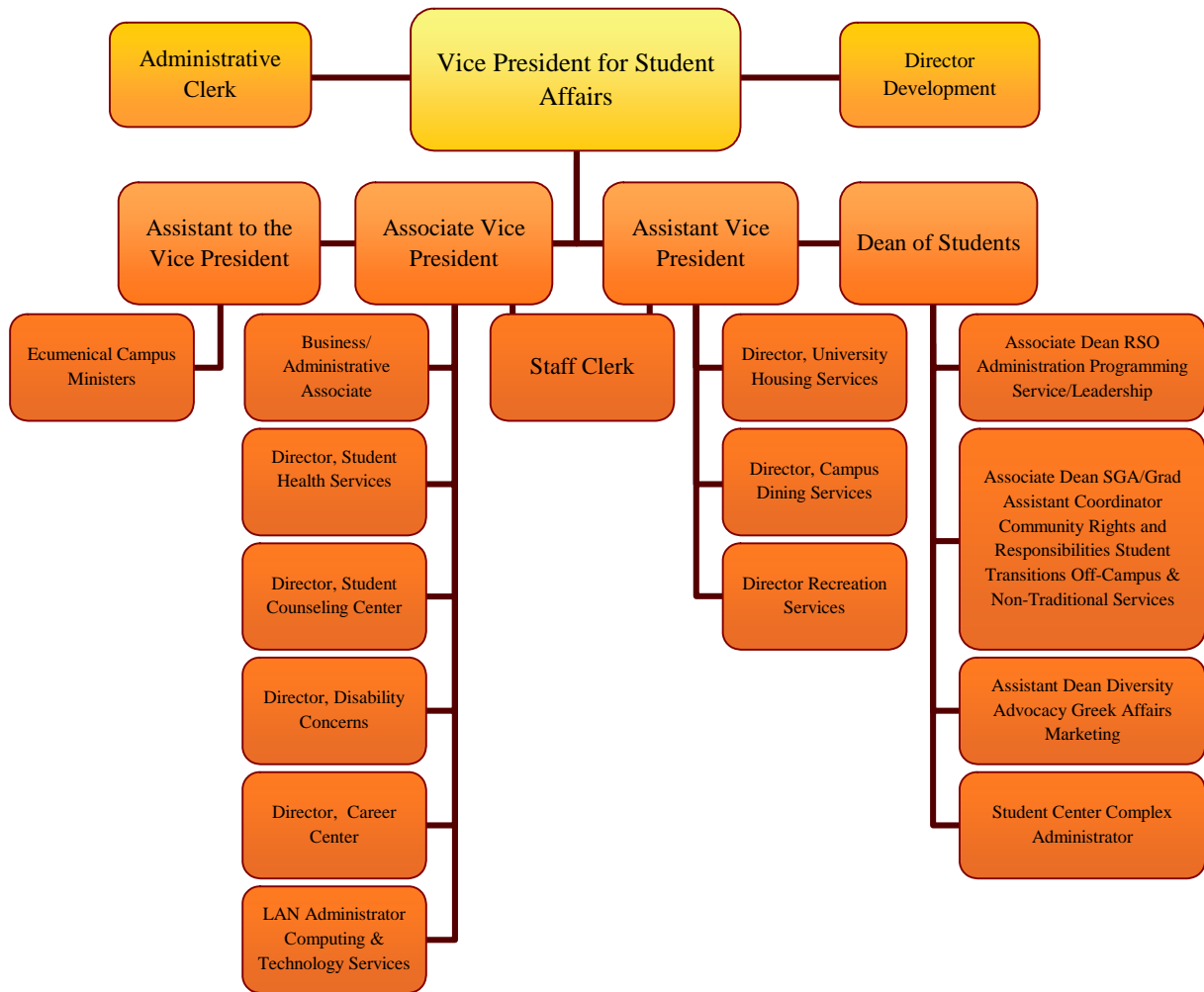
Vice President for Finance and Planning Stephen M. Bragg

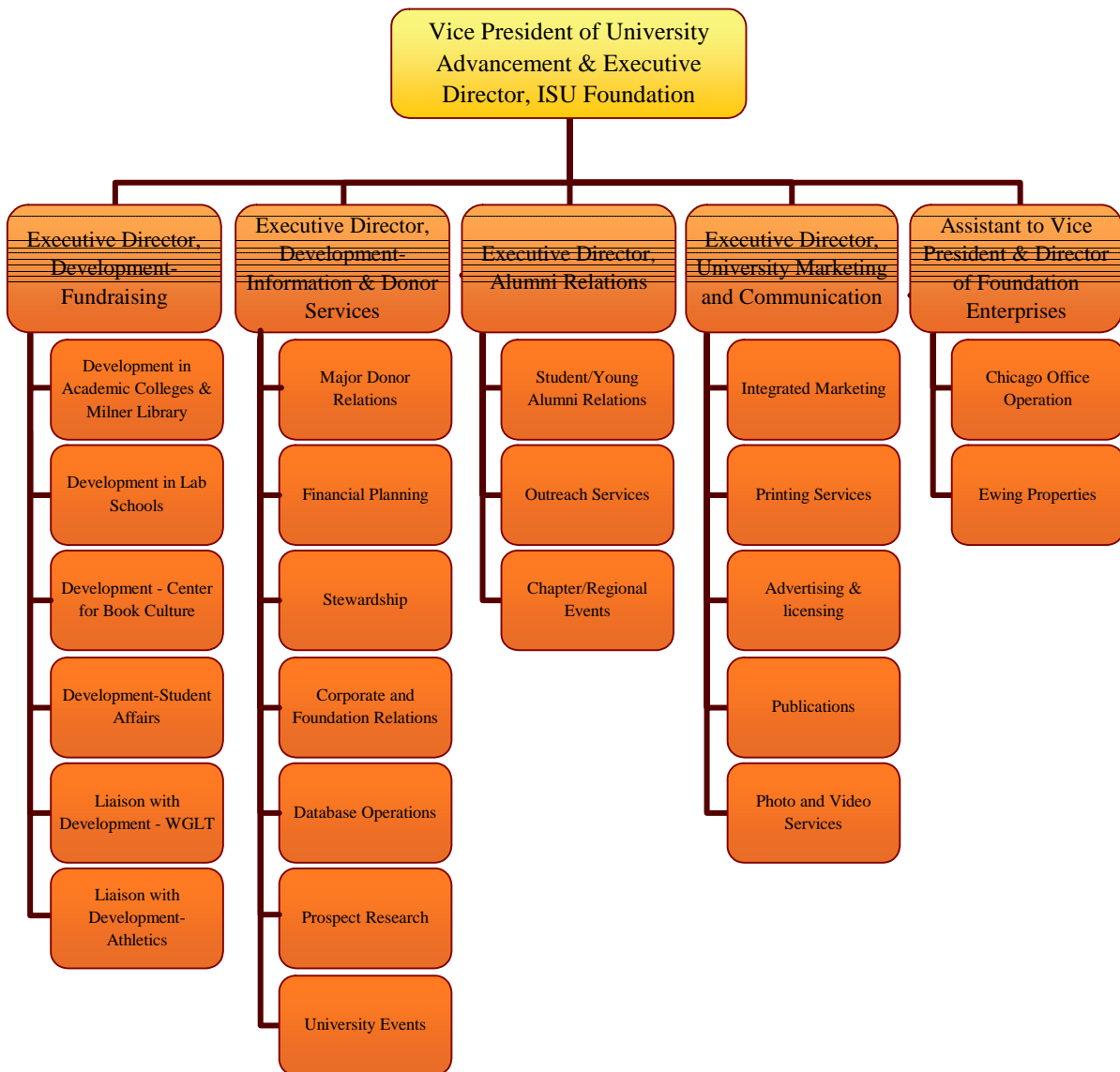
**Vice President for Student Affairs

The tradition of an endowed chair in education dates back to 1502 when the mother of Henry VII established the Lady Margaret Professorship of Divinity at Oxford. More than 200 years later the first endowed chair was established in America, the Hollis Professorship of Divinity created in 1721 at Harvard.

Endowed chairs offer many benefits to the donor, the honored scholar and students. An endowed chair offers Illinois State University the opportunity to offer a more diverse curriculum that is not dependent on usual income sources such as tuition and state funds. Endowed chairs also offer the means to attract, retain and to honor distinguished faculty.

The esteemed scholars who are chair holders receive recognition for personal achievements in their fields and the satisfaction that the University supports research and teaching in their discipline. Students are challenged and guided by exposure to the highest quality academic leadership.

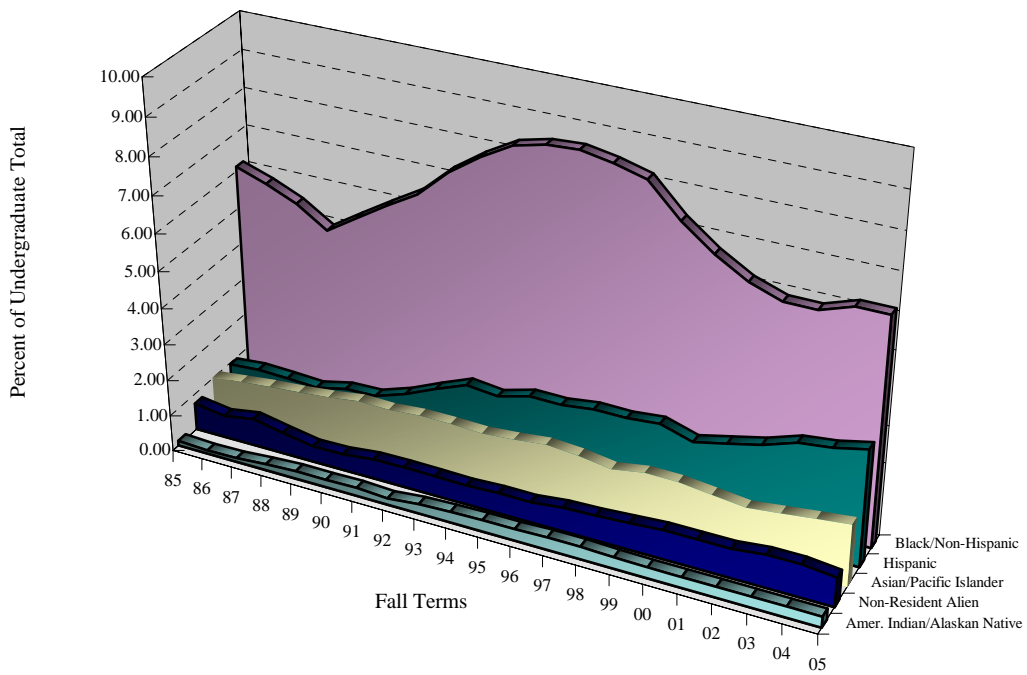

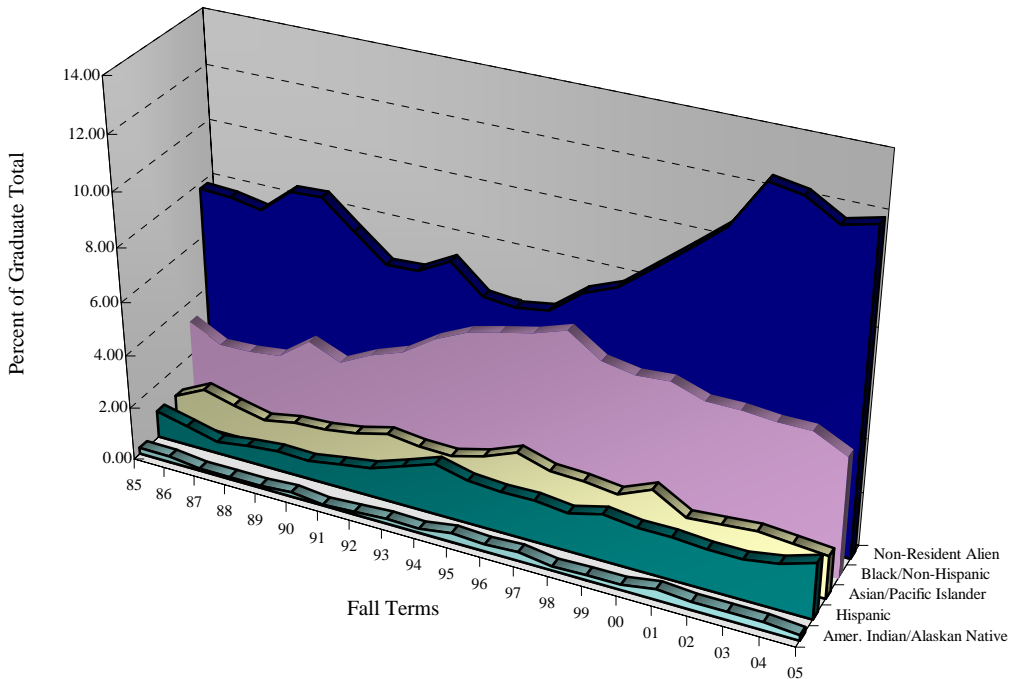

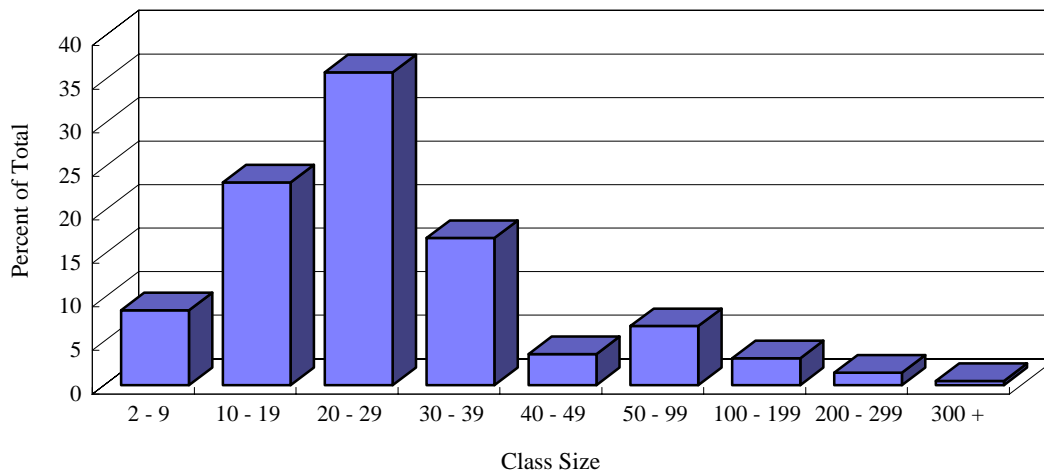

Educating Illinois 2003-2010 contains a goal for the University to decrease the average time to degree for new beginning freshmen maintaining continuous enrollment from four years and one semester to four years. The 1999 average time to degree decreased to 4.3 years for the 1999 cohort from 4.4 years for the 1998 cohort. For native undergraduate students (Fall cohort 1999) who graduated from Illinois State University, 57.3 percent finished their degree in four years or less. An additional 36.7 percent graduated in the fifth year, and 6.0 percent graduated in the sixth year.

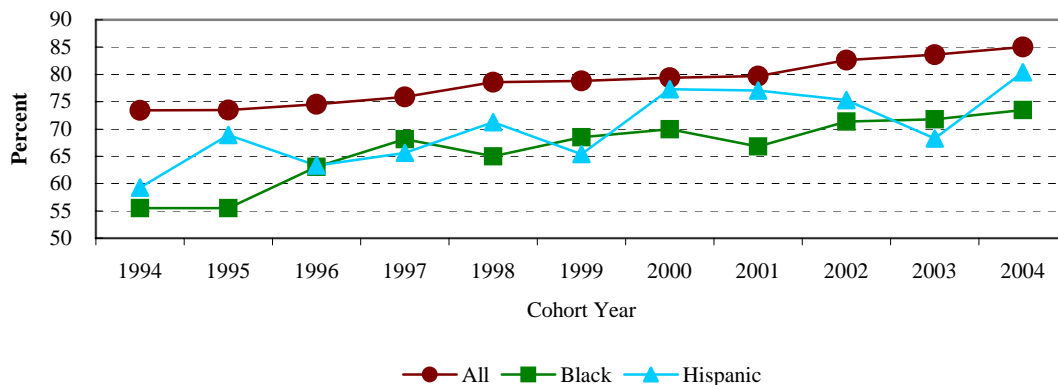

Persistence of Freshmen Cohort to 2nd Fall



Educating Illinois 2003-2010 set a fall-to-fall retention rate goal for new beginning freshmen of 88 percent. The current rate for fall 2004 freshmen is 85.0 percent.

Educating Illinois 2003-2010 also contains goals to increase minority freshmen retention rates to levels more comparable with non-minority students. The difference between minority and white non-hispanic retention rates decreased from 12.1 percent to 10.2 percent.

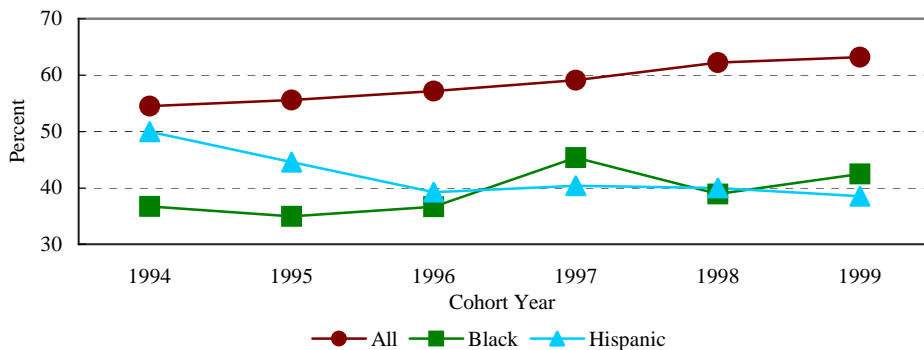

Educating Illinois 2003-2010 contains a goal to increase the University's six year graduation rate from 60 percent to 67 percent. The current rate is 63 percent.

Educating Illinois 2003-2010 also challenges the University to increase the graduation rate of minority students to levels more comparable with non-minority students. The difference between minority and white non-hispanic graduation rates increased from 25.8 percent to 31 percent.

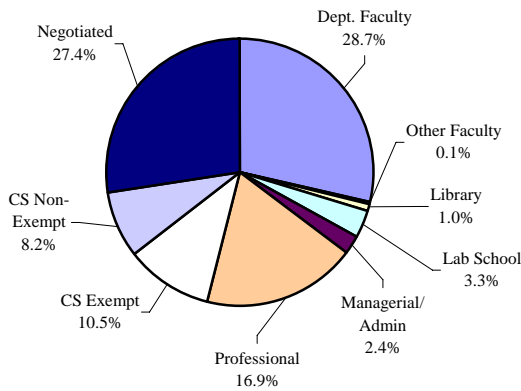

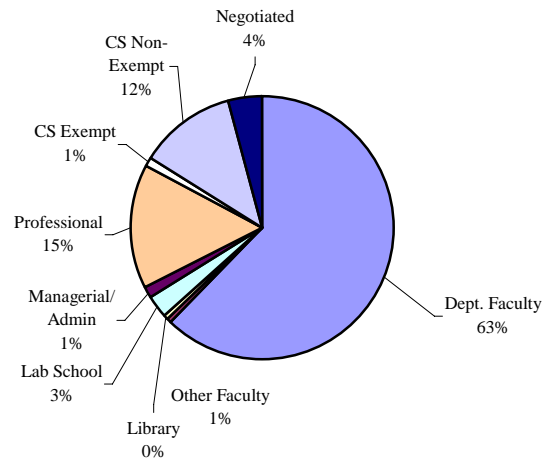

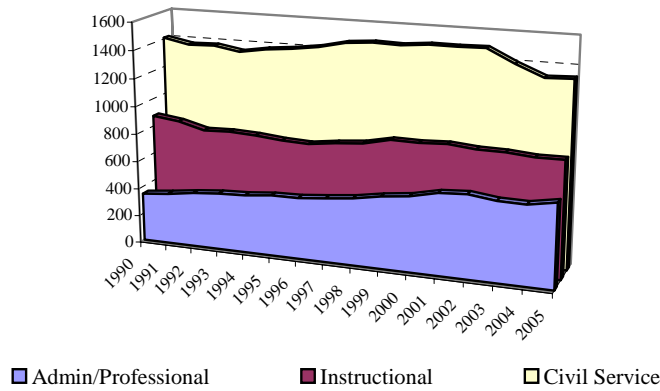

Fall 1990 through Fall 2005

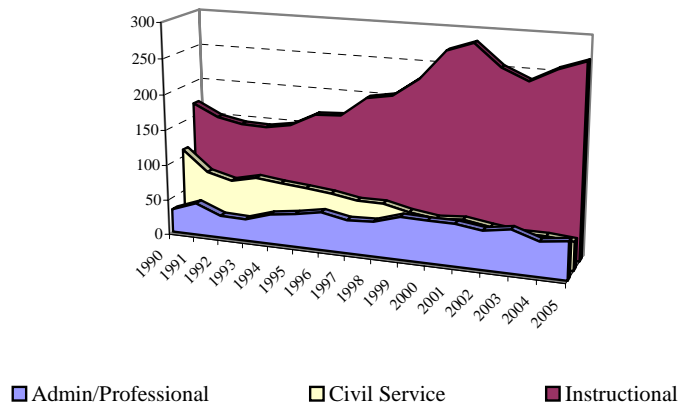
University Employees by Type

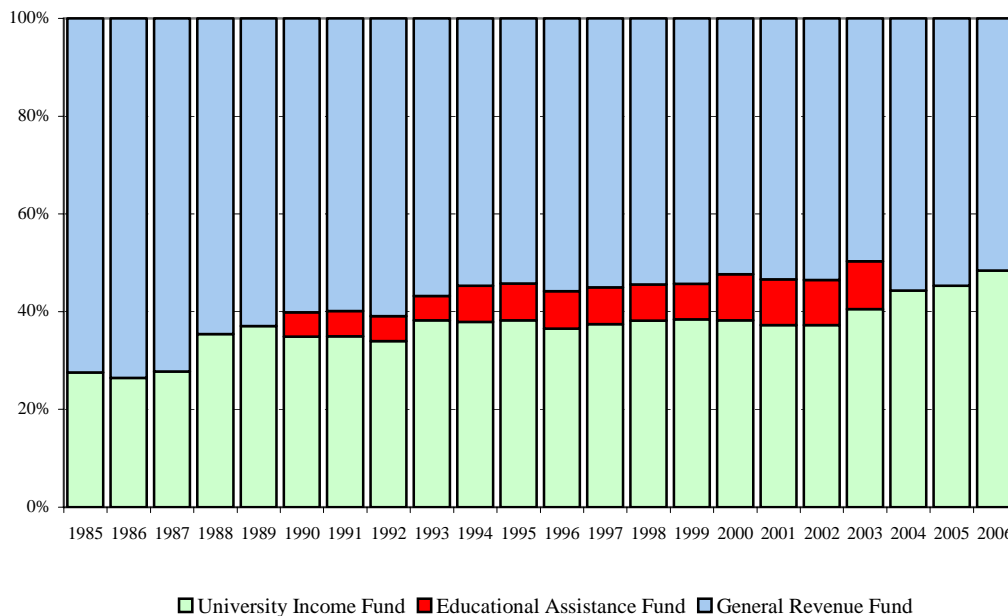

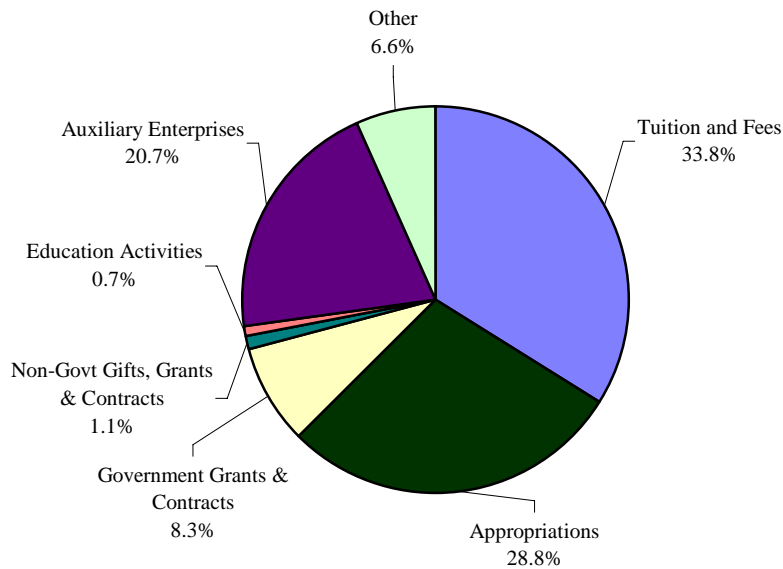

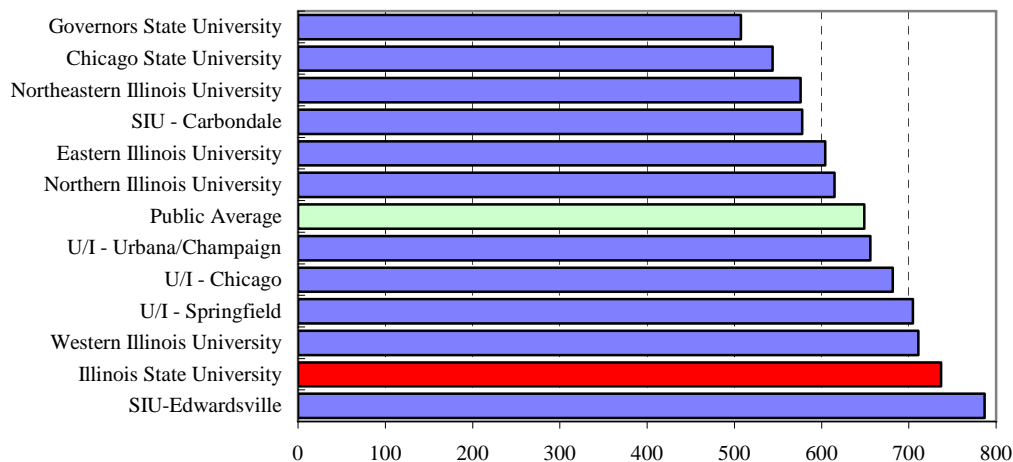

Credit Hours Per Instructional Staff-Year - Fiscal Year 2004



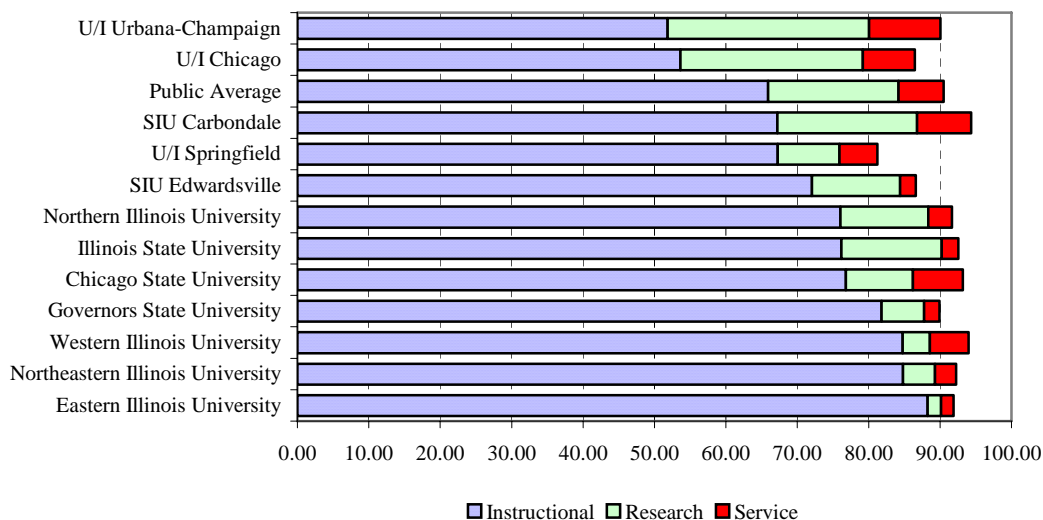

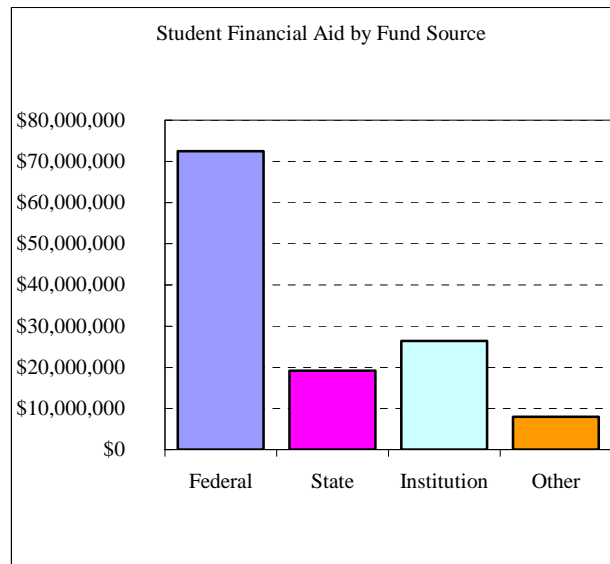
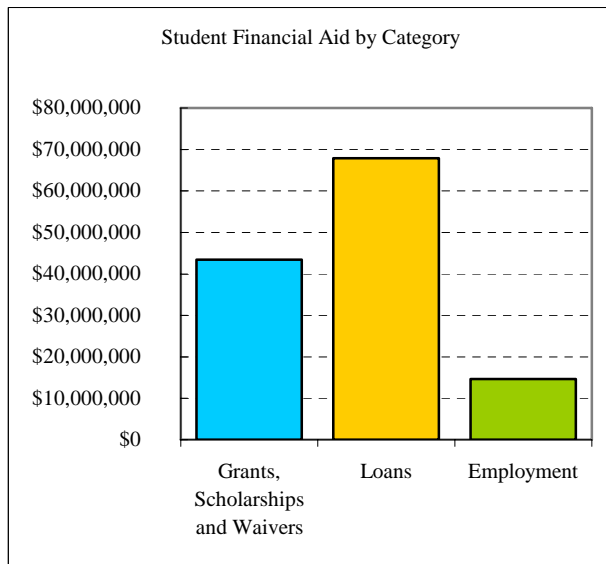

In 2002 Illinois State University completed a facilities condition assessment. The Facilities Condition Index (FCI) is an indication of the deficiency value rating of a building. It is calculated by dividing the estimated cost of current deficiencies by the replacement value of the facility. An aggregate FCI of 44.68% evidences the overall condition of campus facilities was found to be in fair to poor condition. National standards suggest that buildings with an FCI greater than 10% are in poor condition. Estimated maintenance repair dollars total \$478.5 million for residence buildings, academic buildings, and other University owned structures not listed in this publication.

Buildings without an FCI or repair costs were not assessed for one of the following reasons: less than 10,000 square feet; combined with adjoining facilities; scheduled for demolition, or are not connected to the centralized utility systems.

Definitions

Student

Census Day: The University's official date for enrollment. For ISU it is the first day of class following the 10th day of class in each semester.

Certificates: Illinois State University currently offers three types of certificates at the graduate level:

- **Graduate Certificate:** Requires a minimum of 9 but no more than 17 semester hours of graduate courses beyond the bachelor's degree. This type of certificate is **not** approved/reviewed by the IBHE.
- **Post-Baccalaureate Graduate Certificate:** Requires a minimum of 18 semester hours of graduate courses beyond the baccalaureate degree, but less than required for a masters' degree. This type of certificate is approved/reviewed by the IBHE.
- **Post-Master's Graduate Certificate:** Requires a minimum of 24 semester hours of graduate courses beyond the master's degree but less than a doctoral degree. This type of certificate is approved/reviewed by the IBHE.

CIP Codes: Classification of Instructional Programs. A federal coding system used for reporting enrollment.

Cohort: The number of new beginning freshmen in a given fall semester. Used in calculating retention of students returning for their second fall semester and in calculating University graduation rates.

Credit Hour: A standard unit of measuring course work; credit hours are assigned to a particular course and count toward graduation.

Degree Program: A program which has specific requirements and number of credits, including a common core for all students seeking a particular degree. Degrees are approved through a curricular process through the Board of Higher Education.

End of Term: A file saved after the last day of classes, finals, and grade reporting each semester. Off-campus enrollment is more accurate if counted at the end of term.

Full-Time: For undergraduate students – 12 or more credit hours; for graduate students 9 or more credit hours per semester.

Full-Time Equivalent (FTE): Total number of credit hours divided by 15 for undergraduate students; and by 9 (IPEDS definition is 12 hours) for graduate students.

Grade Point Average (GPA): The total number of grade points divided by the total graded semester hours attempted at Illinois State University.

Graduate Assistants: Students working toward a graduate level degree that are hired by the University to teach, do research, or fill office positions while continuing their education. A Graduate Assistant receives a monthly stipend plus a tuition fellowship.

Graduation Rate: Total number of native students who complete their degree within 6 years of normal time divided by the number in the original cohort.

Headcount: The count of each student enrolled at the University.

Interdisciplinary: a program or course that spans two or more academic disciplines.

Major or Program: A cohesive combination of courses, including introductory, intermediate, and advanced course work, that designates a student's primary area of specialization.

Minorities: Includes American Indian/Native Alaskan, Black Non-Hispanic, Asian/Pacific Islander, and Hispanic racial/ethnic designations. Non-Resident Alien is not included as a minority.

Native Students: Students who start as new beginning freshmen at Illinois State University.

New Beginning Freshmen: First-time, first year students who have not attended any college since graduating from high school (includes students who attend a college or university the summer after high school graduation, students with advanced placement credits, and students who took courses for college credit while attending high school).

Student Continued

New Students: Students attending Illinois State University for the first time (Illinois State University baccalaureate recipients entering their first semester as a second bachelor – are considered readmitted students).

Non-Degree Seeking: A student who has not been admitted to a program leading toward a degree; these include unclassified students, students-at-large, and students working toward a non-IBHE approved/reviewed graduate certificate.

Non-Resident: A student whose principal residence is not in Illinois.

Non-Resident Alien: International students who are neither a United State's citizen nor United State's permanent residents.

On-and Off-Campus: A student is considered "off-campus" if all of their courses meet at a

location other than a University facility; they are considered an "on-campus" student if any or all of their courses meet at a University facility.

Retention Rate: Number of new beginning freshmen who return for their second fall semester divided by the original cohort.

Semester: A semester at Illinois State is the 16-week academic session offered each fall and spring. The summer session is not considered a semester.

Transfer Student: Students who previously attended one or more semesters at a community or four-year college after graduating from high school (whether or not any course work was completed).

Unclassified Students: A person who desires to take classes at the University without working toward a specific degree.

Employee

Administrative/Professional: Appointments primarily for the purpose of mission support and include a wide range of responsibilities.

- **Administrative (A):** Employees with primary executive, administrative and managerial assignments. These assignments involve planning, organizing, managing and directing the university and its sub units with a reporting line of three levels from the President and a salary level of 55.
- **Managerial (M):** These employees are considered to be primary policy decision making administrators who report directly to the President or to one of the Vice Presidents of the University. This group would include the President, Vice Presidents, Deans and Associate Vice Presidents.
- **Professional (P):** All Administrative Professional employees who are not designated as (M) or (A).

Civil Service: Civil Service positions are governed by the State Universities Civil Service System. Candidates must demonstrate their ability to perform by passing a test specifically designed for the job. Areas of Civil Service employment are: Office Support, Para-Professional, and Building Service. The civil service system has four classifications of employees:

- **Exempt:** Excluded from overtime provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act; typically managers and administrators.
- **Non-Exempt:** Paid by the hour and eligible for overtime under provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act.
- **Negotiated:** Civil Service employees belonging to a union with a negotiated contract.
- **Extra Help:** Hired to work without benefits for a limited time (up to 900 hours and without requirement of a civil service examination).

Employee Continued

Emeritus: Employees with faculty rank on continuing appointment who retire while still employed at Illinois State University shall be accorded the privilege of retaining their professorial title after retirement with the added designation of the word "emeritus" or "emerita."

Faculty: Any Regular Tenure-Track or Non-Tenure Track appointment, ranked or unranked, for the purpose of instruction, organized research, and/or public service in one of the academic (credit hour producing) departments and related areas.

- **Departmental:** Faculty teaching in an academic department.
- **Non-departmental:** Faculty in a non-academic department such as University College instructors.
- **Lab School Associates:** Appointments that do not hold rank in an academic department and are assigned primarily to Thomas Metcalf School or University High School.
- **Library Faculty:** The role of a Milner Library faculty member differs from that of faculty members in other colleges. One of the primary differences, is that for library faculty, the traditional evaluation framework of teaching, scholarly and creative productivity, and service is more appropriately viewed as librarianship, scholarly and creative productivity, and service. While the area of librarianship includes teaching as an important component, it also includes several other components that constitute an even larger part of a library faculty member's duties.

Full-time: A work schedule of 37.5 to 40 hours per week; considered to be 100%.

Minorities: Includes American Indian/Native Alaskan, Black Non-Hispanic, Asian/Pacific Islander, and Hispanic racial/ethnic designations. Non-Resident Alien is not included as a minority.

Part-time: A work schedule of less than 100%.

Tenure: Tenure is an important means of protecting the rights of members of the faculty to freedom of inquiry, research, discourse, teaching, learning and publications. Tenure entails the faculty member's obligation to strive continuously to improve competence and to cooperate with colleagues in an effort to improve the quality of scholarship and teaching at the institution. The freedom and security provided through academic tenure are fundamental to the success of a university in fulfilling its obligations. After the expiration of a probationary period, teachers or investigators have permanent or continuous tenure, and their service should be terminated only for adequate cause, except in the case of retirement for age, or under extraordinary circumstances because of financial exigencies.

- **Tenured/Tenure Track:** Tenure is granted by the University under the authority granted to the President by the Board of Trustees. Tenure appointments shall be held only in academic departments or similar academic units.
- **Non-Tenure Track:** Appointments for full and part time appointments shall be for a specific purpose and for a specified period of time appropriate to that purpose. No time served in any of the non-tenure track titles counts toward fulfillment of a probationary period leading to tenure.

Rank: The academic ranks that shall be conferred for tenure at Illinois State University are: Professor, Associate Professor, and Assistant Professor. Promotion within the academic ranks shall be recommended by the Provost to the President for approval.

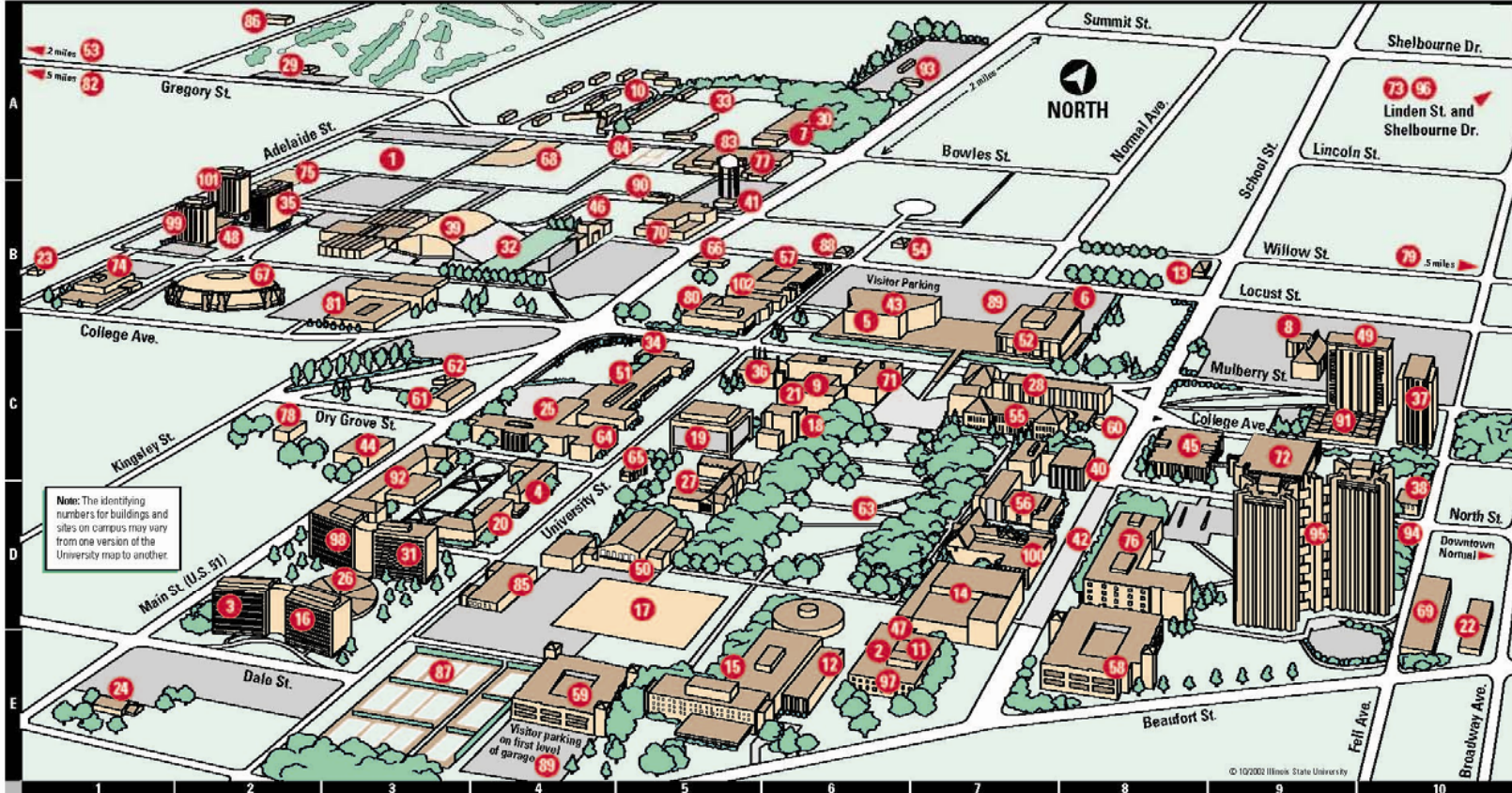
Other

IBHE: Illinois Board of Higher Education, the statewide planning and coordinating board for higher education institutions in Illinois, approves/reviews degree programs, provides budget recommendations to the Governor and General Assembly, administers a variety of grant programs, approves operating authority for independent institutions, and maintains comprehensive high education databases.

IPEDS: The Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System conducted by National Center of Education Statistics (NCES). IPEDS began in 1986 and involves annual data collections. Survey data are required from all postsecondary institutions that have a Program Participation Agreement (PPA) with the Office of Postsecondary Education, U.S. Department of Education. IPEDS also requests limited data from approximately 3,000 other schools offering postsecondary education programs.

NCA: North Central Association of Colleges and Schools is the accrediting association for Illinois State University.
