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

for the year members of Gamma Chapter have been devoting their services to the library at the local Boys' Club two nights a week. The Chapter has been appropriated \$200 for the selection of new books for the Club.

During Book Week in November three of the members of ABA, Donna Bailey, Virginia Shillings, and Mary Rose Clipp, with the aid of Miss McCalla, sponsor, gave a fifteenminute radio program for the purpose of promoting more asd better reading. The program was broadcast over a local Terre Haute station.

HISTORY OF A B A

On October 30, 1945, the twentytwo Library Science students and the eight librarians of Northwestern State College held a banquet in the Private Dining Room of the Student Center at Northwestern State Collego. The guest speaker for the occasion was Miss Nora Beust, Specialist in School Libraries, U. S. Office of Education; accompanying her was Miss Sue Hefley, Louisiana State Supervisor of School Libraries, and Miss Mary W. Harris, Assistant Librarian of the Louisiana State Library. Miss Beust spoke on "The Rewards of Librarianship." At the conclusion of the formal program, the group discussed the possibility of organizing a Library Science Club on the campus, with a view toward the eventual development of -a national Fraternity.

A brief constitution was drawn up by a committee; and then on January 10, 1946, the group of students and librarians met again, adopted the constitution, and formally organized the Northwestern State College Library Club. Azoline Stevens was clected its first President. Mrs. Lucille Carnahan was chosen as Sponsor and Dr. Eugene P. Watson as Adviser, positions which they both still hold.

Frances Smith served as President in 1947-48. During this year, the Club started publishing a "Library Science Newsletter" for the alumni, and the first annual award was given to the most outstanding senior graduating in Library Science.

Bernice Jackson Evans began her term as President during the follow-

ing school year. In October the members considered the advisability of founding a National Fraternity, but decided that the time had not yet arrived for such action. In the fall, the Club held a tea for Mrs. Florrinell F. Morton, Director of the Louisiana State University Library School. Mrs. Morton told of the varied types of library work done by the L. S. U. graduates. In the spring the Club was host to Dr. Lawrence S. Thompson. Director of Libraries at the University of Kentucky, who spoke on "Library Schools and Their Graduates." In April delegates went to the Louisiana Library Association Convention.

In March, 1949, delegates went to the Louisiana Library Association Convention; and the following month, Mr. Artbur T. Hamlin, the newly appointed Executive Secretary of the Association of College and Reference Libraries, was guest speaker at a tea.

During the year the group had been thinking constantly about the establishment of the long-dreamed-of Fraternity; and in the spring it was decided to go forward with the plans. A constitution and a set of by-laws were prepared; and, on the evening of May 3, 1950, in the Drawing Room of Varnado Hall, The American Librarians' Fraternity, Amerikaniki Bibliophylaken Athelfotes -ABAwas founded. A petition for the establishment of a Chapter of the Fraternity on the Northwestern State College campus was received immediately after the organization of the Fraternity was completed; and the Alpha Chapter was installed that same evening. Thus began the first coeducational, undergraduate Library Science Fraternity in the United States.

The Beta Chapter was established at Mississippi State College for Women, Columbus, Mississippi, on December 2, 1950; and the Gamma Chapter was established at Indiana State Teachers College, Terre Haute Indiana, on February 8, 1952. The installation of Beta and Gamma make the Fraternity the largest Library Science Fraternity in the United States, with respect to the number of Chapters. The National Presidents have been Helen Belisle 1950; Sallie Harper, 1951; Jo Ann Scott, Feb.-Mar., 1952; and Ann Baird, Mar., 1952-Jan., 1953.
