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

Greetings, Members of Alpha Beta Alpha:

We, as members of Alpha Beta Alpha, should be very proud of our Fraternity. Since the first chapter was established six years ago, we have grown rapidly, until at the present time we have fourteen chapters with another soon to be installed at Tallahassee, Florida. This speaks well of our Fraternity, as it shows that more and more colleges and universities are beginning to see the importance of librarianship and how Alpha Beta Alpha can further the library profession.

However, there are probably many schools with Library Science departments that know nothing about this undergraduate library profession. I should like to suggest to each chapter that if you have not as yet selected a project for this year, why not set out to get other library schools in your state interested in forming an Alpha Beta Alpha chapter. At the beginning of last year, my own chapter, Zeta, was the only chapter located in West Virginia. We wrote letters to the other colleges and the university in our state and told them about our profession. You can imagine how pleased we were, when, on April 14, 1956, several members from our chapter, along with our sponsor, installed Nu Chapter at Marshall College in Huntington, West Virginia. Quoting from our National Constitution, Article III, Section I, "A chapter of this fraternity (Alpha Beta Alpha) may be established in any degree-granting institution which

is accredited by any recognized national or regional accrediting agency, and which offers courses in Library Science on the undergraduate level carrying a total credit value of at least twelve semester hours." Why not take as your motto for this year, "Heip Alpha Beta Alpha grow"?

Let's all keep in mind our National Convention to be held April 26th and 27th at Indiana State Teachers College, Terre Haute, Indiana. Gamma Chapter will be the host chapter. Since we have not had a convention for three years now, let's make this one especially good, and have a large delegation from each chapter. I am looking forward to meeting each one of you at that time.

From the Executive Secretary's Office

At the close of the 1955-56 year, the Fraternity numbered more than 1,000 members in fourteen Chapters, and had a bank balance in excess of \$2,000. This year there are excellent prospects for adding at least three more Chapters—as we go to press, arrangements are being made for the installation of Omicron at Florida A. & M. University, Tallahassee; a petition from Our Lady of the Lake College (San Antonio, Texas) is now being circulated among the Chapters and the Executive Board; and Southern Illinois University seems to be very much interested in ABA.

There can no longer be any doubt that Alpha Beta Alpha is here to stay, and that it will soon be making its influence felt on the national level. A few relatively minor internal organizational matters still need to be handled, and these can undoubtedly be disposed of at the Convention next spring; but, now that ABA is definitely "coming of age," we should concentrate our attention upon launching a nation-wide project which will stimulate a widespread interest in librarianship, and which will give the Frat a great deal of publicity.

Mu is now publishing an excellent mimeographed "Chapter Newsletter," as Delta, Iota, and a few other Chapters have been doing for several years.

All indications point to a very important and splendid National Convention at Terre Haute, Indiana, (Gamma) April 26-27. It is sincerely hoped that all fourteen Chapters will be represented so all can participate directly in the formulation of the poli-

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
