

REMEMBER FOUNDERS' DAY MAY 3

AMENDMENTS

The following proposed amendments to the National Constitution will be discussed at the Convention:

Article III, Section 1: add the words "four-year" before the words "degree-granting."

Article III, Section 2, Sub-Section A, (1): add the word "undergraduate" after "bona-fide"; substitute the phrase "enrolled in one or more" for the word "taking"; add "active" before "student membership."

Article III, Section 2, Sub-Section A, (2); add "active" before "professional member."

Article IV, Section 2: after "semester." add "(or quarter)."

Article IV, Section 3, last sentence: after "total", add "active."

Article V, first and last lines: add word "National" before word "Conventions" in both cases.

The following proposed amendments to the BY-LAWS will also be presented for discussion and possible action.

Article III, Section 1, Sub-Section A: for the existing parenthetical statement, substitute: "(no reduction in this amount may be made, even though the individual may not be an active member during the entire fiscal year)"

Article III, Section 1, Sub-Section G: revise the entire Sub-Section, and add a fairly heavy penalty of some sort for delinquency.

Does anyone else have any suggested amendments that should be considered?
