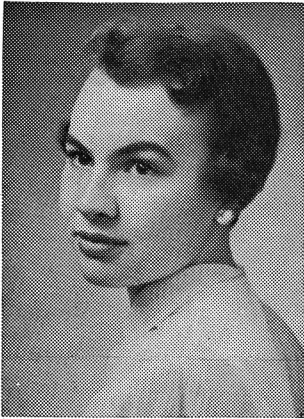

EXECUTIVE SECRETARY'S COLUMN

After many and excessive delays, we have finally gotten the 1956-57 dues records straightened out, and have had the National "books" audited (a summary of the audit report appears elsewhere in this issue).

At the recent ALA Midwinter meeting in Chicago, the ABA Sponsors held a breakfast; representatives of Gamma, Eta, Mu, Pi, and Xi were present, as were representatives from two petitioning institutions, Northern Illinois University (DeKalb) and St. Catherine's College (St. Paul, Minnesota). This was a most stimulating get-together, and we discussed many aspects of the Fraternity and its work.

It is quite evident by this time that our originally projected proposal of having simultaneous Book Fairs in all Chapters during National Library Week cannot be achieved during this first year. Some of the Chapters will hold Fairs at the scheduled time; other Chapters will delay their Fairs until summer; and other Chapters will not be able to conduct Fairs this year at all. Book Fairs are excellent sources of revenue, and they are most appropriate activities for organizations such as ours; so we

sincerely hope that by 1958-59 all Chapters will be conducting annual Fairs.

Rho Chapter was installed at Kutztown State College, Pennsylvania, on November 20. In addition to the two groups mentioned above, a group from Shepherd College (Shepherdstown, West Virginia) is also petitioning for a Chapter (Phi?!).

The ubiquitous Susan Bush has persuaded the ISTC printer to print copies of our National Constitution for us at a very low price; so we hope to have an ample supply of copies by the end of this semester.

The design for the new membership certificates has now been determined upon, and it is very attractive. We hope that we will be able to have these certificates ready for distribution before the end of May.

President Mellott has appointed a Nominating Committee, so we should soon be having an election of officers for 1958-59.

Plans are already under way at Illinois State Normal University for the 1959 Convention.

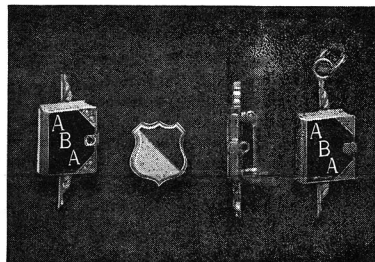
