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

WHAT THE CHAPTERS HAVE BEEN DOING

The following information extracted from the wealth of material contained in the "Annual Chapter Reports" for 1958-59 may prove helpful to all Chapters in planning and conducting programs and activities.

Three Chapters held fifteen or more meetings during the year. Two Chapters issued newsle.ters. Four Chapters sent representatives to library association conventions. Four Chapters presented a Library Science award to their outstanding senior on Senior Day. Two entered decorated car in their college homecoming day parade (one of them won a prize!).

With regard to professional activities, a number of Chapters participat-

ed in a variety of programs-set up Book Week display, donated books to Vegerans Administration Hospital, conducted library orientation tours for freshmen, sponsored installation of a book-drop outside a school library, gave books to a home for unwanted children, served as co-hosts for a "College Day," organized a story-telling group at an elementary school, helped set up a test-file in a college library. Members of some of the Chapters were privileged to participate in excellent field trips to the Library of Congress, the Folger Library, a VA Hospital Library, the U.S. Government Printing Office, a publishing house, the U.S. Office of

TOWARD IMPROVEMENT

The following suggestions for improving the Fraternity and its Chapters constitute a compilation of the points brought out during the Circle of Information discussions conducted at the 1957 and 1959 National Conventions.

IMPROVING RECRUITING

Active Student Members

At the beginning of the fall semester, obtain a list of all library science students and all other students interested in librarianship, and contact them personally.

All members obtain and wear fraternity pins.

Send notices and literature to every student interested in attending meetings.

Whenever possible, take advantage of college assemblies, using book talks.

Prepare attractive displays and set them up at strategic points, using pamphlets on librarianship.

Make use of local publicity media—student newspaper, radio, TV, city newspaper.

Hold dinners or teas for those interested in librarianship.

Sponsor joint activities with various other organizations on the campus to improve public relations and gain recognition.

Host a national or regional convention on the campus.

Provide loan funds and scholarships for those interested in librarianship.

Arrange for the provision of student work-scholarships in the college library for the better students, in hopes of persuading them to become librarians.

Make materials readily available on librarianship as a career.

Maintain booths with recruiting material at group meetings, conventions, college days, and registration.

Reach children in elementary school.

Reach parents of children.

Sponsor career nights, with panels on librarianship—both on college campus and at high schools.

Sponsor a library day or week each year.

Arrange for individuals and Chapters to participace in high school career and vocation days—use slides showing work experiences, social activities, libraries, and librarians.

Promote the organization of library clubs in high schools, and visit them.

When doing library practice work, show active interest in boys and girls, and make librarianship seem attractive to them.

Try to collect alumni dues from seniors at the time of graduation.

Alumni

Request Chapter Sponsors to write personal letters to non-member alumni.

Encourage alumni members to try to interest boys and girls in librarianship.

During workshops for high school librarians, present new ideas and techniques for helping in recruiting.

New Chapters

Correspond with library science club members in other colleges.

Arrange as many personal contacts as possible with members of library science clubs in other colleges.

Arrange for Chapter Sponsors to have opportunities to discuss the Fraternity with sponsors of library science clubs in other colleges.

Invite library science club members from other colleges to visit your campus for chapter programs or cortals.

Where the distances involved are not too great, arrange for joint field trips with the members of library science clubs from other colleges.

IMPROVING OUR PROGRAM

Have varied programs at Chapter meetings.

Levy a fine against any Active Member who is absent from a Chapter meeting without a valid reason.

Issue a "chapter newsletter," and exchange newsletters with other Chapters. (Personal items could then be eliminated from The Alphabet?) Engage in the practice of inter-Chapter visitation.

Sponsor district-wide meetings during non-convention years; these meetings should be informal.

IMPROVING OUR FINANCES

Compile a "handbook" and require all new members to buy it.

Conduct book-fairs.

Education, and the National Archives.

Socially speaking, nine Chapters held banquets or dinners; two held dinners; two held luncheons; five went on picnics; nearly all Chapters held parties—Christmas parties being the overwhelming preference, with Thanksgiving and Hallowe'en next in popularity. Chapters organized excursions to places of interest, dramatic presentations, etc.

Nine of the Chapters celebrated Founders' Day with either a banquet, a picnic, a tea, or a birthday party (one Chapter even had a birthday cake with nine candles!)

Numerous Alphabetalphans received honors and recognition during the year—three seniors were awarded graduate scholarships, and one was given a graduate assistantship; many merited scholarship awards, election to honor societies, and places on the college honor roll and in the student hall of fame; members were elected student body officers, officers of religious organizations, class officers, club officers, and cheerleaders—one member served as a U. S. guide at the World's Fair, and another reigned as a football queen.

The Chapters financed their activities in several different ways, chiefly through selling things—books, sandwiches, costume jewelry, Xmas and all-purpose cards, pecans, cookbooks, "rummage", doughnuts. Income for the various Chapters during the year ranged from a low of \$54.00 to a high of \$659.63, with an average of about \$230.00. The close of the year found treasuries ranging all the way from a scant \$2.03 to a comfortable \$220.39 with the average amount in the till being about \$75.00.

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
