

First Regional Conference At Gamma

(Note: — The bi-ennial National Convention of Alpha Beta Alpha is meant to be supplemented in the intervening year by regional conferences. We are publishing the following article so that other chapters in other regions may be moved to hold such a conference, and may gain suggestions in carrying out a regional conference.

Gamma Chapter (Indiana State College at Terre Haute) first thought about a regional conference at the National Convention in Millersville last year. At that time Gamma Chapter was elected to organize the first regional.

The wheels began to turn almost at once. It was not until August, 1961, that the first official correspondence concerning the conference was mailed. At the luncheon, the guest speaker was Dr. Haynes McMullen, professor of Library Science at Indiana University. His special interest is in the history of American Libraries, and he spoke on the topic, "Why Go on to Graduate School?"

The alumnae of Gamma Chapter prepared the coffee and cookies enjoyed during the registration in the morning; other arrangements, such as the luncheon, were taken care of by the College's Student Union staff.

Gamma chapter feels that the conference was successful be cause everyone helped — active members, pledges, and alumnae went all out to make the Conference a worthwhile one. And the participating chapters did more than their share in the planning and organization of their respectve duties — including attending the conference, which registered 39 student and professional members from four chapters.
