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

#### **EDITORIAL**

EDITOR'S NOTE: As I was looking through the old editions of The Alphabet, I found the following letter from Marilynn Market, National President of Alpha Beta Alpha in 1955-56. It is even more applicable to the profession of librarianship today than it was when she wrote it.

Alpha Beta Alpha can be proud of its prief history. Its Chapters testify to a leep and urgent need for the recognition of a profession. But what of a "forward look"? What is to be our future, our destiny? What can we do to shape it? What responsibilities do we have for the year ahead? What have we learned from our failures and our successes in the past which will contribute to this "forward look"?

Ours is a profession where leadership is essential. Only through leadership will librarianship stand in equal rank with other professions. We must become a dynamic and vital part of everyday life if we are to fulfill the obligations and vows of our organization and responsibilities of our profession. We must make use of every particle of intellect, personality, talent, even charm, which we have at our command to develop ourselves into community leaders. We must attract to our profession better people than ourselves.

All across the country, groups of interested, alert young people are being organized into library organizations. These groups represent a tremendous potential for service in and out of libraries if they are given direction. It is a delight to hear of such organizations, and to know that they are established with the purpose of recruiting young people into our ranks. . . . Their enthusiasm and interest in librarianship are recognized as a source for the future leadership of our profession. Our own organization can furnish tremendous stimulus and encouragement to all such groups.

We are proud of the fact that many new Chapters are being added to our Fraternity, for as we grow in numbers our leadership will grow in proportion.

Along with leadership, we should consider the question of whether our philosophy has kept pace with this fast-moving age - this atomic age in which we find ourselves. Changes in all our ways of thinking, in our attitudes toward life have taken place in the last decade changes which have been reflected in the numbers and kinds of books. Censorship of materials and attempts to question our freedom to read what has been written are not unknown. Should we not be vitally concerned about such practices and should we not actively participate against them? "Democracy is a dangerous way of life, but it is ours." What are we doing to preserve it?

Our motto — Books, People, Service, Life — can be the foundation on which to build our program. Let us search our hearts and minds to find the answer to these problems.

#### National Presidential Comments:

Well, this school year is drawing to a close and so is my term of office. I have enjoyed serving as your National President even though there were times that it was a big headache. I am not sure what I have done to help ABA, but I am sure that ABA has helped me. It has given me the responsibility and friendship that I have needed since I came to college.

I pray that the chapters have been

drawn closer together into one body instead of a group of separate bodies throughout the United States. As the years go on, we must always remember our Motto—Books, People, Service, Life. We must give our Lives to Serving People with Books.

As I dream of the future, I see a Chapter of Alpha Beta Alpha in every school in the United States that offers Library Science on the undergraduate level—and instead of ABA being a national organization, I see it as an international organization. I dream of being an ABA Chapter sponsor and of someday being National Executive Secretary.


