REGULAR MEETING.

NORMAL, ILL., June 4, 1902.

The Board of Education met in the office of the president of the university at 9:00 o'clock a. m., Wednesday, June 4, 1902.

Present—Messrs. Bayliss, Capen, Gastman, Hainline, Robertson, Sandham, Walker and Mrs. Young.

On motion of Mr. Walker, Mr. Gastman was chosen president protem.

The minutes of the meeting of Dec. 18, 1901, as printed, were approved.

It will be observed in comparing the attendance with the attendance of the last two years that the number of women has not diminished. There is a falling off in the attendance of men. The same change is observed in many other state normal schools, and in the literary departments of our colleges and universities. Young men are flocking to the technical schools. The business world now offers abundant inviting opportunities. Teaching is less attractive. The relative increase in the number of women teachers in the public schools is at equal pace with their increase in the schools that prepare them for their work.

It is recommended by the faculty that hereafter, if at the time of the annual commencement any student lack no more than two credits of completing his course of study and declare his intention of taking the required studies in the summer school, he be permitted to take part in the graduating exercises, and receive his diploma from the president upon the satisfactory completion of the course.

THE COURSE OF STUDY.

It is recommended that in the 4-year program the work of geography be deferred until the spring term of the first year. This will enable the students to complete two preliminary courses in nature study and physical science. The elementary course in United States history may then be placed at the beginning of the first year and the three terms of grammar consecutively in the second year.

It is recommended that Phillips & Fisher's elements of geometry be adopted instead of the MacNie now in use, and that the Crew & Tatnall laboratory manual of physics be adopted instead of the Chute manual now in use. It is further requested that the teacher of physics be permitted to use Crew's elements of physics with some of his classes during the coming year.

In addition to electives provided in the course as adopted by the Board of

Education in 1900, the members of the faculty offer elective courses in astronomy, trigonometry, modern English history, modern European history, the history of Illinois, advanced economics, Browning, the Elizabethan drama, and recent English poetry.

THE TRAINING DEPARTMENT.

The union of the practice school with the public school of Normal has proved eminently satisfactory. The local board of education and Superintendent E. A. Fritter have rendered every possible assistance in our work. With 24 classes below the high school we are enabled to grade the pupils more carefully. We have classes of ample size, and for our more advanced students we can provide teaching under substantially the same conditions as obtain in ordinary public schools.

During the past term 98 students have taught in the practice school. Of these 21 taught two classes in the same subject; 17 have taught two subjects daily; others have taught one class per day. The demand for classes has been so great that the critic teachers have had little opportunity to teach themselves. The interests of the children require that a part of their instruction be received from the regular teachers. It is recommended that another critic teacher be appointed for the seventh grade (fifth year) in the public school system.

THE FACULTY.

The recent additions to our faculty have made the work of the past year in many ways more satisfactory than in previous years. Classes have been so large as to make impossible proper attention to the individual student. Our average class enrollment is now about 35. The heads of departments and some other teachers visit the practice school daily and assist student teachers in planning their work.

Miss Wilkins, who has served for ten years as assistant in history and geography, requests a year's leave of absence for study at the university. Her work as a teacher and her personal influence among the students have been of the highest value to the institution. It is recommended that the request be granted.

It is recommended that the work in geography be separated from the defipartment of history, and that Miss Mary Judson Averett be given charge of the geography with the title Teacher of Geography. It is also recommended that Mr. McCormick's title be Professor of History and Civies.

The following extra teachers have been employed for the summer terms:

John Arthur Strong. grammar; salary \$25 per week. Herbert Bassett, physics and chemistry; \$25 per week. Sarah E. Griswold, primary methods; \$40 per week. Nathan A. Harvey, zoology and botany; \$50 per week. B. C. Moore, mathematics; \$25 per week. William A. Lewis, history and civics; \$25 per week. Albert B. Wolfe, literature; \$25 per week.

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS.

At the last meeting of the Board of Education it was ordered that lockers be placed in the gymnasium. Sixty lockers have been placed in the men's gymnasium, 168 lockers, with dressing closets, in the women's gymnasium. The total cost of this improvement has been \$817.79.

Sixty-seven trees of 17 species have been planted in the campus. The bare areas about the buildings have been graded and seeded. The total cost of the improvement has been about \$190.

It is recommended that a cement walk be built along the east and south sides of the main building and that the basement entrances be repaired. This improvement will cost about \$300. It is recommended that the walls and ceilings of the assembly rooms be repainted; estimated cost, \$70.

About one-third of the lot set apart for a school garden has been laid out in individual beds, usually three feet by five, and planted in vegetables and flowers. About 100 normal students and 320 children of the practice school have received allotments. It is evident, however, that but little valuable instruction in floriculture and horticulture can be given by our regular teachers. There is imperative need of a greenhouse and a competent florist if any substantial work is done.

In accordance with your instructions I have obtained estimates of the cost of a greenhouse. The financial report and estimates for the coming year will show that this expenditure can be met.

The greenhouse at the Southern Illinois State Normal School, 50x20, with main portion 24x24, cost about \$1,800. The plans are here for your inspection.

Lord & Burnham of New York, for a greenhouse 18x50x12, complete, ask \$2,150, besides the cost of the foundation and brick work and workroom, estimated at \$1,200.

Plans are here for your examination.

Hitchings & Co. of New York ask \$1,800 for the same.

In the light of these estimates it is probable that a suitable greenhouse, equipped, will cost \$3,000.

Fritter, superintendent of practice school, \$200; F. W. Westhoff, teacher of music, \$1,300; and that Miss Marion Lyons be elected for one year in place of Miss Wilkins with a salary of \$900, and Miss Lora Dexheimer be elected critic teacher in seventh grade with a salary of \$270.

Mr. Walker moved that the sum of \$100 be allowed and ordered paid to Mr. Capen, chairman of the committee on buildings and grounds, for extraordinary services during the current year.
