The National Convention of Alpha
Beta Alpha was held on April 26 and 27
at Cedar Falls, Iowa. Eight members
from Mu Chapter attended the two day
affair. Paula Kesner, Junior in Elementary, was the official delegate,
while Kay Ward, Junior in Social
Science, served as alternate. Others
attending were Janet Kopriva, Susan
Joliff, Beverly Stahlar, Arlita
Warrick, and Janet Hoevet. Miss Eunice
Speer, National Executive Sacretary of
ABA, and Wanda Fanter, National Treasurer, presided during three of the
general sessions of the convention.

Approximately 100 students and faculty members from all 27 chapters attended the convention, The main theme was "Focus on the Profession." Guest speakers at the convention included Dr. Leslie Dunlap, director of the library at the University of Iowa; Rachel Schenk, director of the library school at the University of Wisconsin; and Sara Fenwick, assistant professor at the graduate library school of the University of Chicago.

Members from Mu Chapter participated in the general meeting, discussion groups, and circles of information. Going to and returning from the convention, stops were made at the Herbert Hoover Library at West Branch, Iowa, the State University of Iowa library at Iowa City, and the Knox College Library at Galesburg, Illinois. All of those who attended the convention found it quite informative and enlightening and said that they had benefited from the exchange of ideas.

Mu Chapter can certainly be proud of itself concerning the paperback book sale held on April 22, 23, and 24. This sale was the first of its kind held on the ISNU campus and can only be termed "a big success." Held in the lobby of Milner Library, the sale offered paperbacks on almost every topic of interest. Especially gratifying was the work done by individual AMA members. All of the books were selected by chapter members from individual publisher's lists. An excellent publicity campaign, under the direction of Clara Doorn, made the sale known to almost every student on campus. Book marks were issued to instructors to be distributed to students, announcements were made over the local radio sta tions and the campus public address system, and articles were featured in the Pantagraph and the Vidette.

Over 1600 books were ordered through the Co-op Book Store and after final tabulation it was learned that 981 books were sold over the three day period. ABA earned \$110.50 with only \$3.75 spent on supplies leaving a net profit of \$106.75. The chapter is indebted to Mrs. Orval Yarger and the Co-co for their assistance in this venture. Special recognition should also be given to Barbara La Bedz, general chairman of the sales; Kay Ward, chairman of the book selection committee which chose over 576 titles; Clara Doorn, chairman of the publicity committee; and our sponsors, Mrs. Fagerburg and Miss Anderson. It is the hope of this year's executive board that the paperback book sale will become an annual event sponsored by Mu Chapter.
