NEW JOHNSON ROOM OPENED IN MILNER

Milner Library recently opened a new room for one of the most valuable collections of children's books consisting of 567 volumes. The library is indebted to Mr. William Johnson, the well known Illinois bookman and collector. On October 31, 1949, Mr. Johnson lost his country home by fire, but managed to salvage a few things including these children's books.

The collection is in a room directly north of the entrance to Milner. Many of the books are first editions; a number are typical of nineteenth century writing and illustrations for children. The value of the collection lies in its being representative of the best in children's books during the first half of the twentieth century.

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
