The biggest news of the year is that our application to Alpha Beta Alpha has been accepted. The officers are making plans so that as soon as possible, January or February, the club will be initiated. Then the Milnerites will officially become the Mu chapter of Alpha Beta Alpha.

As you may know Alpha Beta Alpha is the only Library Science Fraternity for undergraduates. Its purpose is to bring about a closer relationship between students and librarians; to serve as a recruiting agency for librarianship; to further the professional knowledge of its members; and to provide wholesome recreation. At present there are twelve chapters and we shall be the thirteenth.

Any professional, sub-professional or direct staff member of any of the libraries on the campus of Illinois State Normal University shall be eligible to become a professional member in the chapter.

Dues are two dollars per year, with an initiation fee of two dollars.

Any former student, graduate, or any former staff member of any of the libraries of Illinois State Normal University shall be eligible to become a life-member in the chapter. Life-membership dues are five dollars. Alumni members may not vote or hold office, but may participate in all other activities of the organization. The basic strength of A.B.A. is dependent upon the size and distribution of its membership, for it is largely through the Alumni members that the Fraternity will make its influence felt. STUDENT LIBRARY ASSISTANTS ASSOCIATION ORGANIZING

Miss Ruth Karloski, former student at I.S.N.U. and present Librarian of Bent School in Bloomington, informs us that a meeting was held October 1, 1955, to establish an organization for student library assistants in a five county area surrounding Bloomington-Normal.

The founding of the organization for student library assistants is being done under the auspices of the Illinois Association of School Librarians. The first meeting of the budding organization was primarily to set up a committee for the nomination of officers. The officers of the group will be elected from the young people who attended the first meeting.

The election will take place during the next meeting. The date for the next meeting has been set for Saturday, April 21, 1956, and the tentative plans call for the meeting place to be Bent School in Bloomington. In addition to the election, the group will undertake to write a constitution and decide on an official title. For relaxation the group hopes to listed to Mr. Gregor Felson speak.

In attendance at the fall meeting were young people and their school librarians from at least five counties near Bloomington: Macon, De Witt, McLean, Peoria, and Clark.

"This is not the only area in which the student assistants are becoming organized; Champaign county is highly organized," said Miss Karloski. She added, "And there are some who have not yet begun a program of this type."

When asked what the purpose was for organizing student library assistants, Miss Karloski gave this opinion: "As a group the students will be able to

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meet and share their experiences and ideas with others in eventual state-wide meetings. It may also be the key to awakening new interests in librarianship and for adding impetus to an already existing interest. The fun of traveling to another part of the state or being host for a meeting which will attract student assistants in grades six thru twelve from outlying counties may reach the proportions of 'Highlights of the Year.' Such a feeling could be a big boost to the profession."

Another goal of the group is to publish a newsletter and send it to elementary, junior and senior high schools. Any school librarian whose student assistants are not aware that there is an organization for them are urged to write: Miss Ruth Karloski, Librarian; Bent School, 904 North Roosevelt Avenue, Bloomington, Illinois. Miss Karloski will forward all information pertinent to the organization and its activities.

PROFESSIONAL ACTIVITIES

During the recent Illinois Library Association conference in Chicago our librarian, Miss Eleanor W. Welch, was chairman of a workshop on reference and circulation work for all types of libraries. The group was a very large one and discussion from the floor was lively. Among topics discussed were: in service training for librarianship, care and circulation of periodicals and new titles which are available, worthwhile fiction of 1955, and the need and use of statistics. The report of this and other meetings of the conference will appear in the ILA RECORD.

Miss Welch has been appointed chairman of the Nominating committee for ILA for next year.

Our Metcalf Elementary School librarian, Miss Ruth Zimmerman, participated in a panel of the Children's Librarians' Workshop entitled "Criteria for Selection of Records and Films in Children's Programs and the Use of Such materials."

At this panel there was considerable discussion about combining films and film strips with stories. For instance, while studying pioneer days one might show films of life on the Western frontier and sing songs of Davy Crockett. Miss Zimmerman talked of the general criteria for selection of films and recordings. She brought out points in the selection of musical recordings and speaking recordings. In summary, she stated, "One must ask if their materials will meet the interests of the community and will they make impacts which will develop new interests."

Miss Clara Guthrie, Reference Librarian at Milner Library was elected chairman of the College and Research Library Section of the Illinois Library Association at their convention recently held in Chicago. Although she has not made definite plans for her term of office, she knows it will be her duty to plan next year's program.

Those of you who are interested in guiding the reading of students will find help from Mrs. Metzler's article on pages 659-660 of the April, 1955, issue of the WILSON LIBRARY BULLETIN. Some of you may even have worked on the case studies she describes!
