


Throwback to 1995...

What's So Special About Special Collections?

Echoing Voices from the Sverre O. Braathen Correspondence Collection: Luisita Leers

Collector and circus fan Sverre O. Braathen and his wife Faye developed relationships with many of the top circus performers of the day. Braathen's ongoing and active correspondence with them reveals little-known details of the circus and of personal lives that paint a rich picture of the industry and surrounding social and cultural events that shaped the mid-20th century. A meticulous collector, Braathen saved carbon copies of his own letters alongside the replies he received, leaving behind 22 linear feet—and a complete record of these conversations. Braathen exchanged letters with circus star Luisita Leers



(1909-1997) from 1931 until 1959. In addition to the letters, Special Collections holds photographs, posters, pamphlets, and programs that document Leers' life and career.



Martha-Luise Kroekel was born in Wiesbaden, Germany on October 14, 1909. She studied with her stepfather, Guido Kroekel-Leers, eventually becoming a single trapeze performer and strongwoman known as Luisita Leers. Leers made her professional debut in 1920 with the Leers-Arvello Troupe, an act that combined Roman Rings and acrobatic pyramids in an aerial display of strength. She was eleven at the time and went on to develop a solo trapeze act that she began performing in 1926. Leers' act included a neck-hang on the trapeze bar held while doing a vertical split, a one-arm planche (or plange), and a series of as many as 139 back rotations around the trapeze bar.

Her tremendous strength garnered attention, and Leers' worked with a number of famous circuses and performance venues, including procuring a contract with Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey Circus from 1928-1933.



When Leers attained center ring status for The Greatest Show on Earth, she spent winters in her homeland; she continued working in U.S. venues until 1936, traveling between Europe and America. In 1938, against the looming backdrop of WWII, she was forbidden from leaving Germany. She served her country as a performer until war conditions made that impossible. Leers' letters to Braathen resumed after the war, detail the grueling life she endured during and after. Among other issues, her apartment in Berlin was bombed twice, she was in the hospital for a foot surgery, and postwar, when severe food shortages were the norm, she was left begging her American circus friends for food, clothing, and shoes.






In a letter written June 15, 1938, Leers notes, "I went to Berlin, because I had an offer for a sportive activity. Therefore my arm also should have been operated, so I saw our most renowned Professor Dr. Sauerbruch. It was very hard for me, when he told me, that my arm could not be operated at present, because I am too undernourished. Such are things over here in reality and one has to take them as they are. I am afraid, you people over there really can not realise, how things really are over here. Yes, there is coming some food from Sweden now too. Children may get a little more therefore, but our rations did not increase yet. You surely always hear what we are promised always, but you never hear, what we really do get.

So, for this month we were promised to get 5 eggs. We received only 2 and therefore less meat as ever before, only one ounce for the whole month. Of the promised one pound of fed, we also only received 6 ounces. Now you know."

Though Leers wanted to get back into showbiz after the war, her body was too malnourished to perform her act. This is born out in details from her letters. Shifting focus, she embarked on a new career, using her fluency in several languages to assist British and American forces with translating documents. She eventually went on to turn her attention to the visual arts, becoming a sculptor.

Recipe Corner

Pumpkin Cake Roll

Ingredients

- 3 eggs
- 1 cup sugar, divided
- 2/3 c. pumpkin
- 3/4 c. flour
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- ½ tsp. cinnamon
- 1/8 tsp. salt

Filling

- 8 oz. cream cheese
- 2T soft butter
- 1 c. powdered sugar
- ¾ tsp. vanilla

Directions

- Line jelly roll pan with waxed paper. Grease paper set aside, in large bowl beat egg yolks on high speed until thick and lemon colored. Gradually add ½ c. sugar and pumpkin beat until sugar is almost dissolved.
- In small bowl beat egg whites until soft peaks form gradually add sugar until stiff peaks form. Gradually add sugar until stiff peaks form. Fold into egg mixture. Combine flour, baking soda, cinnamon, and salt. Gently fold into pumpkin mixture.
- Bake at 375 for 12-15 minutes until cake springs back when touched. Cool for 5 minutes. Turn cake onto kitchen towel dusted with powdered sugar. Gently peel off waxed paper. Roll up cake in the towel jelly-roll style, starting with short side. Cool completely on wire rack.
- In small bowl, beat cream cheese, butter, powdered sugar and vanilla until smooth. Unroll cake and spread filling evenly to within ½ in on all sides. Roll up again, cover and freeze until firm. Remove from freezer 15 minutes before cutting. Dust with powdered sugar.
